Frankie Airey
Director and Founder,
Philanthropy Squared

Frankie began her career in development with the Campaign for Oxford in 1987. After establishing the campaign's prospect research function in both Oxford and New York, she led the individual giving division which contributed the lion's share of the philanthropic income to the £342 million raised. The Campaign for Oxford was the first major fundraising campaign for the University and the first major endowment campaign undertaken by any British institution.

Following the Campaign for Oxford, Frankie moved between the UK and Australia working for high profile institutions in executive development roles before identifying a need in the Australian market for an advisory practice that could help inspire a new approach to development. In 2003, Philanthropy Squared was launched.

For over 30 years Frankie has provided support to the non-profit sector. She is a passionate advocate for cultivating a stronger culture of giving in Australia and is committed to re-defining the sector's approach to and understanding of fundraising as a professional discipline. Frankie is an associate member of Philanthropy Australia and has served on several boards including Sadler's Wells Theatre in London and the Malthouse Theatre in Melbourne. Currently, Frankie is the Chair of the Betty Amsden Foundation and is a trustee of the Victorian Arts Centre Trust.

Christina is the General Manager - Development with the Centre for Contemporary Photography, with a particular focus on working with the organisation's Fundraising Committee and Management to design and implement strategies, and deliver fundraising events, including the annual fundraising exhibition.

Christina has practical experience raising funds for galleries specific to the small to medium sector, having also been highly successful at generating revenue for West Space, where she held the roles of Gallery Manager and General Manager from 2013 to 2016.

Key achivements included the delivery of the West Space Annual Fundraiser, which she successfully managed for over three years, improving systems of operation for delivery and streamlining payment processes; and re-launching the West Space Patrons Program including a series of exclusive events.

Ron Fairchild is the Chief Advancement Officer at Deakin University. Sue was also a corporate Community Relations Manager and Executive Officer of the RACV Foundation, and Sponsorship Manager at Melbourne Theatre Company. Sue is experienced in project development, fundraising, sponsorship, and marketing and has chaired the boards of Strange Fruit and the Victorian Actor's Benevolent Trust.

Jason Smith began as the Director of Geelong Gallery in 2016. He is a public art museum director and exhibitions and collections curator with over 25 years experience.

He was previously the Curatorial Manager of Australian Art at Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art; Director and CEO of Heide Museum of Modern Art from 2008 to 2014 during which time he led the critically acclaimed reinvigoration of the Museum's cultural programming and artistic direction; the Director of Monash Gallery of Art from 2007 to 2008; and Curator, Contemporary Art at the National Gallery of Victoria from 1997 to 2007 where he worked

closely with many leading Australian and international contemporary artists.

In the past two years, Geelong Gallery has undertaken significant change in the fundraising space with respect to approach and pitch, and has grown its support base considerably.



Artist Talk



GOSIA WLODARCZAK: ARTIST NOT @(at) WORK, 31 DOMESTIC JOBS FOR DECEMBER

9 APRIL – 18 MAY Deakin University Downtown Gallery

Artist Gosia Wlodarczak's latest project is a series of 31 performances that took place each day throughout December 2017. While dressed up in designer garments selected from her extensive wardrobe collection, Wlodarczak completed various domestic chores around her home, which were in-turn documented by photographer Longin Sarnecki and uploaded onto social media for interaction. The entire set of 31 photographs will be exhibited as a series of high-resolution archival prints at Deakin University Downtown Gallery. Wlodarczak's project sets out to establish a dialogue between the two phrases: the artist is always working and women's work is never done.
