

Award winning plain English editor and writer Andrew Pegler believes that sometimes words are just not enough ... especially clumsy, badly written ones.

He formed Andrew Pegler Media 15 years ago in the belief that everyone should have access to easy-to-understand, concise information. He calls this plain English and is a loud and proud enemy of gobbledegook, waffle, officialese, legalese and bureaucratese. His plain English clients include CGU Insurance, ANZ, the Prime Minister's Department, Sustainability Victoria, NAB and Rio Tinto.

Andrew's lively plain English workshops are enjoyed by governments, corporations and academic institutions.

He talked at Clarity, the global conference on plain English, and is talking for the second year running about plain English and the law during Victorian Law Week 2018.

Andrew has been a co-host of the "The Conversation Hour" on 774 ABC Melbourne and a commentator on ABC TV. He has written opinion for The Age and his two books are John Howard's Little Book of Truths and The Bugle's Dickionary. He edited the Monash Business Review for three years and wrote and taught An Introduction to Advertising course at Monash University for three years.

Andrew agrees with Albert Einstein that "everything should be made as simple as possible, but not one bit simpler."

Bendigo is approximately 150 kilometres north-west of Melbourne, the Latrobe Art Institute is located in View Street, in the heart of the Bendigo arts precinct.

By Car: Estimated travelling time from Melbourne to Bendigo is 90 minutes.

Parking: In and adjacent to the CBD of Bendigo there are more than 5000 public car parking spaces. The city offers a range of parking options both on and off street.

The best off-street ticket machine car park located within a short walk of Latrobe Art Institute is the Rosalind Park carpark (just behind The Capital Theatre and Bendigo Art Gallery - enter at the junction of View and Rowan streets). The two ticketed multi storey car parks located within a short walk of Latrobe Art Institute are the Edward street multi storey car park and the Hargreaves street multi storey car park. By Train: V-Line offers a regular rail service to Bendigo; the Latrobe Art Institute is an easy 1 kilometre walk through central Bendigo from the station. Estimated travelling time from Melbourne to Bendigo is 90 minutes by train. Walking from Bendigo Train Station to the Gallery takes approximately 15 minutes. Alternatively, from Bendigo Train Station you can catch a number 50, 52, 53, 54 or 55 bus.

New Histories

Immediately following the Professional Development session *Effective Communication for Galleries*, participants will be treated to a private guided tour of the exhibition *New Histories* by Curator, Jessica Bridgfoot. In *New Histories* contemporary artists reimagine ten historic works from the 19th and early 20th century Australian and European collection of Bendigo Art Gallery. Informed by technological, social, environmental, political and historical events that have occurred since the original work's creation, artists in the exhibition revisit interpretations of Australian and European histories through the lens of contemporary culture.

Working across mediums of performance, sound, film, painting and textiles, historic and contemporary artworks will be reframed in a series of installations throughout the contemporary and heritage courts of the Gallery. *New Histories* challenges the nature of art as historic record and the role of the artist and the museum as documenter, and commentator of the world.
