The Lost Impressionist is an exhibition of Jan Hendrik Scheltema's paintings that have come all the way from the Netherlands and were donated to the Gallery by descendants of the artist. Scheltema was a Dutch Impressionist painter who began his career as a figure and portrait painter in Holland. In 1888 he emigrated to Australia and settled in Melbourne to work as an artist. Scheltema quickly moved to livestock and landscape painting. Many of his paintings place cattle and other livestock in the foreground of his landscapes. He would send paintings and sketches back to the Netherlands to show his family how different the Australian landscape was in comparison.

This exhibition of Scheltema's surveys a selection of the artists' paintings from his early portrait pieces to his landscapes where he works to capture the Australian landscape and country life. The Impressionist style has an emphasis on the use of light and the artworks capture movement and evidence of time that the movement was known for.

Wisdom Journey presents a survey of sculptures and prints by Australian artist Jock Clutterbuck. Clutterbuck uses a limited palette and clearly defined, often imposing abstract forms to create a sense of the mystical and ancient in his artwork. Clutterbuck says that he is very interested in ancient relics and artefacts, for example Romanesque carvings and Celtic motifs.

The exhibition *Artist Proof* celebrates the ten-year anniversary of the local Freestone Press with an exciting and dynamic group show of its current members. Freestone Press is a collaborative printmaking studio based in Briagolong. This group of artists work, exhibit and travel together. This exhibition displays a variety of printmaking processes and ideas through the artwork of this collaborative group of artists.

As always, the exhibitions on show will offer a variety of art to for your students to engage with. We look forward to welcoming you and your students, when the gallery reopens Term 2.

Printing

K—VCE

Inspired by Jock Clutterbuck's artwork, students will use foam printing plates and printing inks to create their own abstract prints onto a chin-collé background.

Still Life Drawing

K—VCE

After exploring and discussing Jan Henrik Scheltema's landscape paintings, students will be instructed in some observational drawing. An arrangement of still life objects will be set up for students to draw using grey lead pencils and coloured soft pastels.

Monoprints

K—VCE

After exploring and discussing the prints in the Freestone Press exhibition, students will create their own monoprint. Students will paint a watercolour background using watercolour paper and paints, and then print a monoprint over the top of this background using a pre-prepared drawing.

Indigenous Inspired Bookmarks

K—Grade 6

Students will work with Gippsland Art Gallery's Indigenous Engagement Officer, Angela Chittem, to create their own bookmarks painted on canvas. Angela will talk to students about Gunaikurnai markings and their significance, students will then create their own design and paint them onto bookmarks. Students will also be able to add woven threads and beads to their bookmark.
